A Day at Wetfeet!



Here's the Basics of Wetfeet!

Our Wetfeet Program! The introductory class at Waeg Sailing for our youngest of sailors. This class provides a fun and positive experience and introduces everything to do with the world of sailing and our program. Our instructors spend time with the class on the water, in the water, and on our many boats, allowing sailors to be safe and comfortable while learning the basics of sailing!

Waeg Sailing Wetfeet Camp is designed for sailors aged 6-8 who have never sailed before, or who have completed a previous session of Wetfeet but are not yet old enough for Junior Sailing. It follows the Sail Canada Wetfeet Module and is the perfect way for your child to 'get their feet wet.' Please review this guide and take note of what to bring as well as the Wetfeet day planner before arriving at your first day of camp!

8:30-9:00 AM Sailors are dropped off and meet their instructors at a picnic bench on the hill behind the sailing building labelled **WETFEET**. Sailors are signed in for the day.

9:05 AM The class starts their day. A few morning games are played to start off the day. Lesson plans are announced for the day.

10:00 AM After a morning lesson or activity, the class prepares for the water, where they will do their on-water activity for the morning. This could be a steering lesson followed by an adventure tow, or a wind direction lesson followed by a boat ride!

12:00 PM Lunchtime! Those participating in the Lunch Program will receive their lunches from our staff, and the Wetfeet class has an outdoor lunch supervised by their instructors.

1:00 PM The lunch hour ends, and the afternoon session begins. Sailors prep for the water, have sunscreen parties, and complete lifejacket and closed toe shoes checks. The afternoon lessons will usually build on the morning lesson, and lots of time is spent on the boats and on the water!

3:00 PM The Wetfeet class is usually back on land by 3pm. On a nice day this could be time for an afternoon swim, followed by packing up and preparing for pickup.

4:00 PM The Wetfeet class is underneath their tent on the sailing hill and ready for pickup. Pickup goes until 5 pm.

Typically, for any sailor left after 5 pm, we make phone calls to ensure our sailors get home!

Instructors will always aim to be off the water and ready for lunches and pickup, but we often cannot run on a perfect schedule!

Sailors are not to be pulled out of camp before they are off the water and ready for lunch, unless their instructors are made aware of an appointment at the beginning of the day, or in case of emergency.

Lunch Plan

There is a healthy, brown-bag **Lunch Plan** available for sailors, which also requires registration online at www.waegwoltic.ca. Lunch Plans can be added at any point, but registration prior to the start date of programs will ensure your child receives their lunch every day of the week. No partial week, or by-the-day lunch options are available. Lunch plan is \$55 plus tax per week, attached is a picture of the Summer 2025 menu.

The weeks operate on an alternating schedule so week 1 will happen during weeks 1,3,5,7 and vice versa for week 2 (weeks 2,4,6,8)

Respect

Respect is a crucial element of the success of the Waeg Sailing program. Sailors and staff absolutely must respect the sailing building and all equipment, the entire Waeg Staff, themselves, and their fellow sailors while at Sailing Camp. Any disrespect will not be tolerated, and parents will be alerted of negative behaviour immediately. Being on the water is an amazing opportunity, but also carries with it a lot of risks, and thus listening to and respecting coaches is always necessary for the successful, safe, and fun provision of any sailing camp. Disciplinary action is dealt with on a case- by-case basis and will involve sailors' parents if necessary.

In most cases, parents will be informed of their child's misdemeanour at the end of the day. In more serious cases, parents will be called during the day, or, in severe cases, we will require parents to come to the Waeg to discuss the conduct or pick up their child from sailing programming. These are very rare circumstances, but must be dealt with swiftly and effectively, with parents and our coaches working together to find the best solution to any issue. We have three strikes for this, and if a sailor receives three strikes they are removed from the program. Unacceptable behaviour we do not tolerate can be:

- Bullying, both verbal and physical
- Swearing or use of inappropriate language
- Failure to listen to instructions from Sailing Staff
- Disobeying Waeg Sailing Rules

Strike 1: Verbal Warning – Instructor will go over the behaviour with the sailor(s) to discuss why it might be disruptive/harmful for others and what can be done to make it right. The sailor will also be taken to the Sailing Office to speak with the Head Instructor who will hand out strike 1.

Strike 2: Written Warning – If behaviour continues, a parent or guardian will be notified of their child's behaviour and discuss. The sailor is once again taken to the Sailing Office to meet with the Head Instructor to discuss their behaviour and the sailor will receive their second strike.

The Head Coach and the sailor's instructor will speak with the sailor and their parent/guardian to discuss behaviour and possible solutions. A behavioural incident report will be made that will need to be signed by a parent/guardian and handed to the General Manager.

Strike 3: Meeting – If behaviour persists, the Head Coach, Programs Manager, and Parents/Guardians will work together to discuss the sailor's future in Sailing. In some cases, the sailor may be removed from the Program entirely.

Respect and Sportsmanship is a high priority for us as we do not tolerate any behaviour or language that is offensive or unfit. We strive to create a safe and enjoyable space and for that to take place we need every sailor on board to ensure fun is had by all.

What to Bring

Now on to a lighter note! What to bring when you make your way down for a wonderful day at Waeg Sailing.

It's your first day at sailing! What on earth do sailors wear on the water? Please refer to this list of suggested attire and what to pack in your bag for a day at Waeg Sailing:

- 1. Coast Guard approved PFD
- 2. Waterproof Layers rain jacket, splash pants
- 3. Change of clothes
- 4. Reusable Water bottle
- 5. Long-sleeved shirt
- 6. Swimsuit and towel
- 7. Close toed shoes
- 8. SUNSCREEN!!! SPF 50 or higher
- 9. Lunch and snacks
- 10. Hat
- 11. Sunglasses

If you have any questions or concerns about where to find the necessary gear to bring to sailing (particularly lifejackets and sailing gear), please get in touch with us! All items brought to sailing are at the owner's risk as the Waeg is not responsible for any lost or stolen items left in the lockers, in the lifejacket bin, or in the building overnight. **We recommend sailors leave electronics at home while they are at sailing camp.** If, for communication purposes, you would prefer your sailor keeps their cell phone with them, they are to be kept in backpacks, lockers, or in a safe place and not to be used during camp time.

PFDs (Life Jackets)

Coast Guard approved, size-appropriate Personal Flotation Devices (PFDs) must be always worn by sailors and staff, on the docks and on the water. To ensure your child's PFD fits properly, pick them up by the lifejacket - if they can slip out of it, the PFD either doesn't fit or hasn't been adjusted to fit them.



Sailors that do not have a PFD that fits them properly will not be allowed on the water. If you require assistance finding a suitable PFD for your child, please do not hesitate to get in contact with the Head Coach at sailing@waegwoltic.ca for recommendations. PFDs can be purchased at Canadian Tire, the Binnacle, and the Yacht Shop.

Closed-Toe Shoes

To protect our feet at sailing, on the boats and on the docks, we wear closed- toe shoes. If you can see your toes in your shoes, they aren't safe for sailing! **Closed-toe shoes are mandatory to wear at sailing** and children without them will not be allowed to sail. Closed-toe shoes (such

as water shoes or Keens) can be purchased at Canadian Tire, Sportchek, the Binnacle, and the Yacht Shop.

Clothing Tips

Choosing the right clothes to wear to sailing is important! The best advice we can give **don't send your sailor in their nicest clothes**. Clothes and belongings are often lost in the vortex of the building, and our sailors usually don't get sent home as clean as they arrived! Each sailor will have access to a locker or cubby in our building to keep their belongings for the day. Sailors are welcome to leave their PFDs overnight, but all other belongings should be brought home at the end of the day.

All items should be labelled with names!

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Sun Safety

Fun in the sun is awesome, but we need to keep sun safety in mind! This means drinking lots of water throughout the day and at the end of every day. While we always wear sunscreen, we recommend everyone wears quick-dry long sleeve water shirts or sun shirts. This is a best practice we live by! Hats and buffs are also great sun protection products that protect the skin while out on the water. Sunscreen should be applied throughout the day to any exposed skin; there will be designated water and sunscreen breaks throughout the day. Make sure to have your sailor drink lots of water when they come home at the end of day!

Progression & Report Card

Choosing the right level is the first step in ensuring you (or your child) receive(s) the most appropriate and effective programming for their age, size, and sailing ability. Please refer to this guide or contact our Head of Sailing at sailing@waegwoltic.ca to determine which program to register for each year.

These Waeg Sailing classes all run on CanSail Levels from 1-5. At the end of each session each sailor will come home with a progress report from their coach that has numerous levels on the page. The level the sailor is working on will appear with check marks either in progress or completed as well as a written note from their coach. This is a progress report that visualizes the sailor's ability on paper. Doing one of our classes does not necessarily mean your child will receive their entire level but it will show that they are putting both work and effort to get them to receive their next level.

Regardless of level of experience, sailing is for everyone and we as instructors of our sport work to make this sport accessible for all and ensure our program is putting out resilient sailors to keep our community sailing! Expectations for Parents

The staff at Waeg Sailing are dedicated to delivering the best possible sailing programming for all sailors and their families at the Waeg. As we are lucky enough to be a part of the larger Waegwoltic community, we value the input of any involved or interested individuals and appreciate that parents of sailors remain supportive of their child's sailing education and experience at Waeg Sailing. With this, we ask that parents follow a few guidelines to ensure that staff and families alike are well-prepared for the summer, so that we can focus on delivering the best possible Sailing Camp every session.

Please encourage a positive attitude and excitement for sailing. In many cases, learning a new sport can be daunting or discouraging, but parental support can make a huge difference in facilitating a positive experience. Encourage your child to play by the rules!

Please refrain from addressing details of your child's experience at sailing camp during class time. Mentioning it to their instructor or the Head Coach at drop-off or pick-up time (or by emailing sailing@waegwoltic.ca) will allow us to set up a meeting and address any questions or concerns you may have. We value every child's experience and want to handle anything that may arise as swiftly and as effectively as possible.

If your child is struggling with a specific coach, or you feel as though a coach acted in any way inappropriately, please contact the Head Coach at sailing@waegwoltic.ca as soon as possible, with as many details regarding the incident or conduct as possible.

Let your child be on the sailing property with us on their own. We avoid having parents on the boat yard and dock during our programming hours. Let your child be with their instructors and friends. They are in good hands!

Please make sure your child is dropped off and picked up on time, unless previously coordinated with your child's instructor. We ask that parents and babysitters try their best to coordinate other activities and commitments outside of sailing camp time.

We cannot easily bring kids on and off the water individually if someone comes late or leaves at odd time. To help facilitate this, other pickup and drop offs are best arranged over the noon hour. To avoid uninterrupted lessons, we ask that parents and babysitters notify the Head Coach upon

their arrival and allow us to get their child from their class. For safety reasons, we also ask that parents and babysitters do not enter the sailing deck unless expressly asked by the instructor.

Disciplinary action for sailors is handled on a case-by-case basis, and parents will be involved once your child's instructor deems it necessary. In most cases, parents will be informed of their child's misdemeanor at the end of the day. In more serious cases, parents will be called during the run of the day, or, in severe cases, will require parents coming to the Waeg to discuss the conduct, or pick up their child from sailing programming. These are very rare circumstances, but must be dealt with swiftly and effectively, with parents and our coaches working together to find the best solution to any issue.

Frequently Asked Questions

Q: Does my child need to know how to swim?

A: Yes, for safety on the water as well as on the docks, we require all students to have basic swimming capabilities. Particularly for our Opti and 420 Race Teams, swimming is often used in workouts, and it is essential that Race Team athletes are comfortable in the water without their lifejacket.

Q: What if my child has an appointment during the day, or I have to drop off/pick them up early?

A: Please let your child's instructor know ahead of time, or email sailing@waegwoltic.ca with the details. Sending a note with your child is acceptable, if it is delivered to instructors promptly. Please do your best to schedule around sailing camp, to avoid having your child brought in from on-water sessions. Likewise, please limit early departures or late arrivals to as few times a session as possible.

Q: Does my child need their own PFD?

A: Yes! A Coast Guard approved, properly fitting PFD is required for sailing camp at the Waeg. Please don't hesitate to email sailing@waegwoltic.ca for recommendations, or tips on how to ensure your child's PFD fits properly.

Q: If my child and another child collide boats during a sailing lesson, what happens?

A: All our instructors can perform minor repairs, without undue cost to the families of the children involved. We understand that being so new to so many sailors, accidents happen!

Q: If it rains, will sailing camp still be offered?

A: Yes! Sailing will run regardless of weather. In cases of heavy rain, thunder and lightning, or wind too high for beginner groups, sailors will likely work through important lessons on-land and play games in the sailing building. Weather- appropriate clothing is required for sailing camp. Race team athletes should expect very few on-land days and always bring appropriate gear.

Q: I am registering my child in the same session as their friend. Can they sail together for the duration of the session?

A: Our instructors will take this into consideration when making boat crews for each day, but we do not guarantee nor encourage students sailing with the same sailors every day. For the first few days, we do our best to accommodate these so that sailors may get comfortable, but sailing with all other students is required of all recreational sailors.

Q: Do I need to know how to sail to register my child in sailing?

A: No! We cover everything from the very basics to advanced boat-handling skills. Don't be surprised if your sailor starts to try and teach you a thing or two themselves.

Q: Ok, I am interested, how do I learn to sail?

A: We offer private lessons with any of our instructors on an interest basis, simply email sailing@waegwoltic.ca to inquire, or chat with your child's sailing instructor before or after sailing camp. These are designed with you in mind and can be for the whole family or one-on-one with an instructor. Rates vary.

Q: My child can only do a portion of a session, but would really like to sail, can this be accommodated?

A: Partial sessions are assessed on a case-by-case basis, so please get in touch with the Head Coach at sailing@waegwoltic.ca to discuss your options.

Termination of Childcare Space

The Waegwoltic Club recognizes that some summer camps are not always appropriate for all children. Many supports are put into place to create a happy and successful placement for all children. In cases of severe behaviour issues, it may be necessary to terminate the camper from the childcare space. A decision to terminate a child's space will be made in consultation with parents. The Waegwoltic Club's priority is for the safety of all children in its programs.

Custody Arrangements

Parents are asked to explain custodial arrangements when enrolling their children into Summer Camp. When special circumstances apply such as denial of access to one parent, we ask that you provide written documentation of custody and access schedules issued by the court.

Drugs/Alcohol

Children will not be released to accompany a parent or guardian who is under the influence of drugs or alcohol. In such circumstances, our Head Coach Nate Santarpia will call the other parent/guardian, or emergency contact listed and request that they come pick up the child.

Finally, as we've stated many times our overall goal is to provide a safe, fun and exciting learning space for our sailors and to hopefully push through the next generation of sailors who will take the place to grow it even further!
